

The Railway

The Worcester & Hereford Railway was authorised by Parliament in 1853. Although independent it was backed jointly by the Midland Railway and the London & North Western Railway but not financially.

Elsewhere the Oxford, Worcester and Wolverhampton Railway had joined with the Newport, Abergavenny & Hereford Railway to form a new company called the West Midlands Railway. This company who came to the financial rescue of the Worcester & Hereford Railway.

The line from Henwick (west of the Severn) to Malvern Link was opened in 1859. In 1860 the bridge over the Severn at Worcester was completed and work on the section from the Malverns west to Hereford continued. Driving tunnels through the hard volcanic rock of the Malvern Hills proved difficult and a thirty arch viaduct was needed to cross the Leadon Valley at Ledbury. The line was completed in 1861.

The Communities

Malvern Link: Separated from Great Malvern by Link Common, an area of open land that is statutorily protected by the Malvern Hills Conservators. The station is located close to the centre of Malvern Link

Great Malvern: The priory was founded in the I I th century but the town is better know for its spa. Victorian architecture abounds including the classic station. It is a moderate to steep climb from the station to the centre of the town at Belle Vue Terrace

Colwall: Nestling below the Malvern Hills, it is a good centre for exploring the Hills and the surrounding Herefordshire countryside. The station is at the centre of the village

Ledbury: A jewel of a heritage town with Elizabethan timber frame, Georgian and Victorian buildings. An attractive glazed display at the station, gives the town and railway history with a location map.
